Eighteen of these boxes were sent overseas to men in the navy and had to be in the mail prior to November 1. Fifty-two of the boxes went to men serving in the army overseas. These were mailed prior to October 15th. We have three women in the service. One is from Decatur, Clara Uhl, of the Main Office force joined up in September. Two girls from the Los Angeles Office plant are in the service. They



The advice given now applies to both men and women. Fresh, clean clothes improve morale, boost your spirits and give a feeling of satisfaction. If your work clothes need mending do that first.

Brush the clothes and empty pockets which are great dirt catchers. For removing stains, paint thinner and kerosene are the best bet. Brush the spots gently but thoroughly to loosen grease or oil. Don't try to eliminate the spot in this way. Soaping and soaking will finish that job. Two cups of kerosene in ten gallons of water make a good soaking solution. Do the washing in hot soapy water. Starch is desirable in most work clothes. It gives a smooth finish and keeps clothes cleaner longer.
