

That's what Jane Mueller thought. She is the President of the Board of Directors of the Museum which was established to preserve the culture and inventions of the Mueller family and Mueller Co.

There's been a whole lot of building going on! If you haven't been out this direction for awhile, do yourself a favor and come visit. You might even catch a glimpse of a wolf!



"Two Detroits": Almost a Reality

In 1895, Hieronymus purchased a "Benz Motor Wagon" from Germany. Mr. Mueller began to improve this Benz car, and in 1897 two patents were granted him on the following: Variable Speed Transmission, Steering Gear and Body Suspension and Water Cooling Radiator. After these changes to the Motor Wagon, the car was renamed the Mueller-Benz.

Hieronymus' sons, Oscar and Phillip, also received patents on the Mueller-Benz car. Oscar received a patent on the earliest form of spark plug and Phillip, for the distribution head.

Then it happened!

While experimenting with high test gasoline and redesigning carburators, an explosion occurred, and Mr. Mueller was so badly burned that he died a week later on March 1, 1900.

At the time of his death, Mr. Mueller had the parts of three different automobiles under construction. Oscar and Phillip sold their patents and the family's interest shifted from the automobile to brass groups. Thus, the "Second Detroit" came to an end.
