### "Vibrant Hydrants" art show in June!

The exhibit will feature artwork, photographs, decanters, mugs, neckties (?) and any other object we can find which has a fire hydrant on it!

We also hope to have located John J. Smith's photo collection of 145 fire hydrants taken during his travels with the Mueller Co. before his death in the early '70s. He was a member of the "Hydrant Hounds," a group which took photos of fire hydrants. (Not to be confused with FHAP (Fire Hydrant Appreciation and Preservation Society).

Please be as excited about this idea as we are. If you have any fire-hydrant related items--no matter how weird or strange--we'd be interested in borrowing them for our show. # for the Record

It was the Sunday after the winter holidays, and I was trying to bend over in my new jeans and calling myself bad names that rhymed with "pat" and "bat."

Then Evelyn Cox walked in. Evelyn works at the Mueller Co. and doesn't live far from the Museum, so drops in a lot of Sundays. (The one thing I've noticed about Evelyn is that she cannot *not* smile.)

She had a big box in her arms. Inside the box was a pan of caramels. She explained that these were made from the original recipe of Robert H. Mueller who made these delicious caramels from his kitchen in his home.

I told her I couldn't eat caramels because they made my teeth fall out, but I did cut a piece with my pair of scissors and popped it into my mouth.

It melted! I didn't even have to chew!

I accessioned the recipe into our Museum archival records, including a little history on the candy.

When Mueller employees gave blood to the local Red Cross Bloodmobile, the employees would find a bag of caramels on his/her desk afterwards as a reward.

Robert H., the oldest son of Philip Mueller and grandson of Hieronymus, started working at the Decatur plant in 1901 when he was 16.

In 1951, he required a rare type of blood--22 pints worth!--and employees were asked to donate blood. Out of the 288 Mueller employees who donated blood, only 12 had the right type. His wife, Louise, who was extremely active in the local Red Cross blood bank program, directed this search for donors.

He lived for 12 more years following the transfusion, working primarily as chief engineer at the Mueller Company.

I didn't know the man, but I can attest that he knew caramels! Here is the recipe:

3 cups sugar

3 cups crystal clear corn syrup

1 quart whipping cream

1/2 teaspoon salt

Cook sugar, syrup, salt and 1 pint of cream to 240 degrees on a candy thermomenter. Add 1/2 of the remaining pint of cream and again cook to 240 degrees. Add the remainder of the cream and cook to 245 degrees. Stir in 1 cup nut meats (optional) and pour into a well greased pan. This recipe will make four pounds of candy, about 1/2 inch thick. Evelyn says they take about 2 1/2 hours to make. Enjoy!
