

The 49 Club was organized around 1898 and got its name from a stop listed in the Mueller catalog as number 49. This was a very popular stop and difficult to keep in stock. (A present comparison woul be the 3/4 inch H-15000.)

Salesmen who met certain sales quotas were said to be members of the 49 Club. These hard-working salesmen laid the groundwork for city codes to specify Mueller quality products.

Every member of the club was identified by a black lapel button pin or a watch fob with the "49" in gold letters against the black background,.

We tip our hats to all the sales persons, past and present, who were second to none, who have helped mold the name "Mueller as the "Cadillac" of the water and gas industry.

- Hieronymus Mueller's first invention was a burglar alarm pistol—it was unsuccessful. The alarm was simply a pistol that was fired by opening a window, but for establishments or homes with many windows this was not a workable idea. Although this invention was not successful as an alarm, it was later sold as a toy pistol and was used heavily on the 4th of July. Mueller Newsletter, May, 1972.
- George F. Binkley, formerly manager of engineering services, transferred to the Personnel Office March 1, 1974, and was promoted to the position of Personnel Director upon the retirement of Cecil Coffin April 25.—*Mueller Newsletter*, May, 1974. (George is one of our 75 volunteers now at the Museum!)
