# Did Hieronymus make the car?



This motor carriage is owned by James Renzulli of San Diego and may (or may not) be a Mueller made vehicle. The Museum hopes to have this car on display some time in the future or one made from the blueprints of the motor carriages. Hieronymus Mueller won the first unofficial car race in the country in 1895 and received a \$1500 second prize award in the official race in Chicago the same year. The rear of the car shows a #7 leather plate. Could this possibly be the 7th motor carriage made by Hieronymus Mueller? It certainly looks like one. Please see page 3 for additional story.

### For the Record . . .

As you will recall in the last edition, I wrote about locating a motor carriage that may or may not be a Mueller-Benz or Mueller Motor Carriage.

Jane Mueller, president of the Board of Directors of the Mueller Museum, sent my brother-in-law; Jim Batman, to San Diego to visit the vehicle and its owner, Mr. James Renzulli. Jim Batman is a mechanic for the City of Decatur and knows more about cars than I do about any subject.

He took many pictures of the car. He sat in the car. He acted like he was driving the car. He examined the cars on his hands and knees.

When he came back, he wrote a report of his visit, with the conclusion: "I don't know."

He did note that Mr. Renzulli's motor carriage had a wooden frame, but all of Hieronymus Mueller's blueprints indicated a tubular frame for his motor carriages.

"That frame bothers me," he said.

The vehicle is beautiful and has been restored with loving care to represent a motor carriage of the 1900s.

But is it a Mueller-made car?

We asked one of the leading experts in the country (only he insisted he was "the leading expert in the world") who said this automobile is not--and he repeated it with a vengeance--not a Mueller made car, saying, "I know you WANTED this to be a Mueller vehicle. . "

Last year, John Moma of the Mueller Co.gave the Museum approximately 100 blueprints and drawings of the early Mueller motor carriage which had been stored at the company. The blueprints, drawings and illustrations indicate that Hieronymus made at *least* seven vehicles. We also located the blueprint for "Mueller Carriage #8."

We are hoping to have this motor carriage on display in the museum some time in the future, if Mr. Renzulli will loan it to us.

We'll put a great big "I DON'T KNOW" sign on it. And in small print, ". . . but it sure looks like one." And another big thank you to Mr. Renzulli for loving old cars enough to restore such a beauty.

### Turtle talk . . .

Many of our visitors are former employees of the Mueller Co. who have some great memories.

Take Fred Pierce, for instance, who walked through the doors on February 5 and remembered turtles.

Fred, who was Credit Manager for the Company, was an advisor of Junior Achievement along with Lloyd Darnell and Hugh Baker in 1964 and 1965.

"Turtles saved our skin," he said, laughing.

Seems the dozen or so members of the youth program had several not-quite-so-successful business ventures that year, including making trunk latches and "fried" marbles (which were mounted to form clusters of grapes).

"We weren't doing too well financially until someone thought about making chocolate turtles. We worked on Saturdays in our kitchen at home and would take huge chunks of chocolate and melt that and pour it over three pecan halves and some caramel, which we also melted," he said.

"We took orders for those boxes of candy during the Christmas season and were able to return a ten percent profit to the Board of Directors," Pierce said.


