

The Big Coon Hunt . . .



A big coon hunt was held eight miles northeast of Decatur on October 4, 1913. They caught and killed one coon, and one 'possum and three kegs. Many of the hunters did not get home before daylight. We do not know who they all are, but Adolph and Robert Mueller are in second car from left.

The Museum's exhibit, "All Work and No Play" features this photo along with many others showing the Mueller employees at play.

Over 50 activities were offered to the employees, including a Camera Club, fishing, hiking, golfing, baseball, basketball, boxing, Boy Scouts, family picnics, tennis, and many recreational events. Hieronymus, the founder of the Mueller Co. and the patriarch of the family, was quite an inventor himself, although some inventions were a little better than others.

For instance, his first invention was a "burglar alarm." He wired a gun to a window, so when the window went open, the gun fired. He later turned it into a toy pistol.

Spark plugs, Crown roller skates, tapping machines, bicycle kick stands are only a smattering of these patents held by the Mueller family.


Frank Lloyd Wright (like)

As many of you are aware, there is a street in Decatur called Millikin Place which boasts three Frank Lloyd Wright homes--two having been built for Adolph and Robert Mueller.


But what some of you do not know--and neither did Adolph and Robert--that Frank Lloyd Wright did not actually design the homes. His assistant, Marion Mahoney Griffin did.

The only "signed" Frank Lloyd Wright home is #2. Adolph's home at #4 Millikin Place is now owned by Millikin University and is home of the President. Robert's home at #1 Millikin Place was sold this past year by Dr. Aiden and Linda Ferry.
