It is a place that will live in the memories of those who worked there.


We are grateful to Millikin University for loaning us Will for this project.

I cried. (I have never understood women who cry about dumb things. Now I do. It works!)


Dan wouldn't even put me on Hold after I yelled: "Don't put me on Hold!"
