## "Hieronymus Hated Horses"

Hieronymus hated horses and thought there should be a better, more efficient way to get around. He ordered a Benz from Germany in 1895--the first automobile to hit the streets of Decatur and one of the first motor carriages in the country.

He wasn't overly fond of it either, so he and his two sons, Fred and Oscar, made improvements to the motor carriage, adding a variable speed transmission, a water-cooled radiator, three forward gears, a backward gear and a modified steering device.

When the motor carriage was overhauled, they hauled it to Chicago November 3, 1895, for the first car race in the country. But only one other car made it to the starting line: the Duryea, manufactured by the Duryea brothers in Peoria.

The Mueller-Benz won that race, but other car owners petitioned the *Times Herald*, the sponsor of the race, for "do-overs." About 40 "moto-cycles" (the name given to these first carriages) owners had indicated their plans to participate in the race, but couldn't get their vehicles to the starting point.

The official race was held Thanksgiving Day and Oscar Mueller was presented a check for \$1,000. The Duryea received a check for \$2,000. But the Gold Medal that was to be presented to the "clear winner" was not awarded since all the participants broke at least one of the very complicated rules.

Following that historic race, Hieronymus and his sons built at least seven more carriages, as we have blueprints in our storage area indicating "Mueller Motor Carriage #8."

We do not know what happened to the original Mueller-Benz, but we do know there was only one with that name. After the first Benz was imported, the



Muellers built their own carriages "from scratch"--adding changes and modifications with each carriage.

We have located a motor carriage which *may*--or may not be--a Mueller-made vehicle. This beautiful, blue car belongs to Mr. James Renzulli of San Diego, CA, who is loaning it to the museum for three years.

We thank Mr. Renzulli, who has won several awards with this carriage under the name "Mueller Co. Decatur, Ill.," for loaning us this attraction for the museum.

Meanwhile, a big door is being built to accommodate the almost 11-foot carriage, a display area is being constructed, and plans call for the car to be delivered before May 1.

We are also grateful to the Mueller Co. for its generous donation in helping defray the expenses for this exhibit.

You won't want to miss seeing this incredible motor carriage--which happens to have a leather #7 on the back! (The Mueller 7th?)


